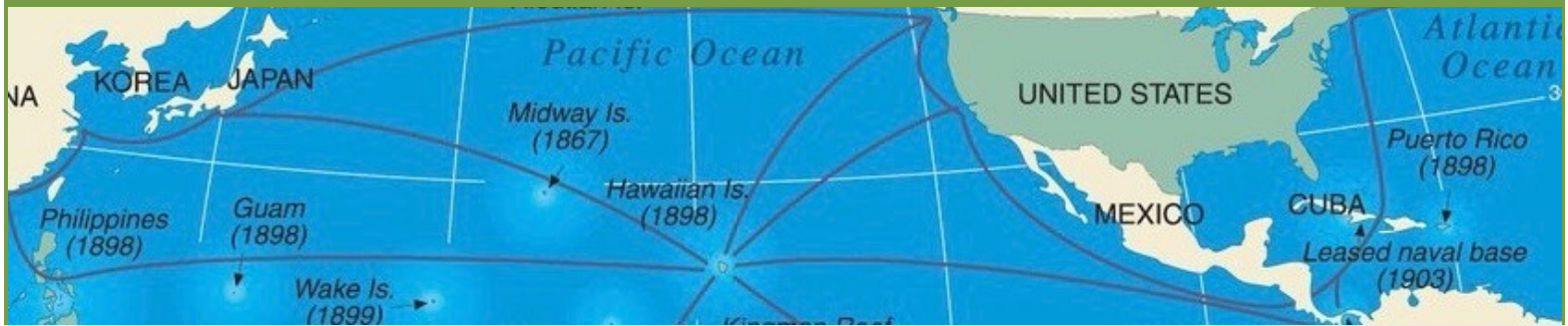

Dr. Julian Lim

Aliens and Empire: Immigration and the Archipelagic Borderlands of the "Greater" United States



Dr. Julian Lim is an Assistant Professor of History at Arizona State University. She focuses on immigration, borders, and race. Lim's award-winning first book, *Porous Borders: Multiracial Migrations and the Law in the U.S.-Mexico Borderlands* (2017), examines the history of diverse immigrants in the U.S.-Mexico borderlands, and the development of immigration policy and law on both sides of the border.

Her current book project is on the history of the plenary power doctrine in U.S. immigration law, and its intersections with federal Indian law and American empire. In her talk she will present some of the research from this current project, which examines the federalization of U.S. immigration law in the late nineteenth century, and connects the development of federal immigration law to contestations over territorial control in the U.S. West and its shifting borderlands.
